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Report title:	Dedicated Schools Grant – 2023-24 Early Years budget
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1. Executive Summary

This report sets out the provisional thinking on the 2023/24 Early Years Block, Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) allocation. It asks for Forum members to comment on the proposals.

2. Schools Forum Actions

The Schools Forum is asked

- i) To agree
 - to consult early year providers on introducing a quality factor into the early years formula.
 - that nursery schools agree the distribution of the supplementary funding (estimated at £1.2m) between themselves.
 - > that the central retentions budget should be set at £875k as per Section 5.2
- ii) To comment on the estimated hourly rate increases
 - > 3 and 4 year olds' from £6.00 per hour to £6.15
 - 2 year olds' from £6.25 per hour to £6.70.

3. Background

- 3.1 The Dedicated Schools Grant (DSG) is broken down into four blocks; one of those blocks is called the Early Years Block. The Department for Education (DfE) initially estimates each Local Authority's (LA's) 2023/24 funding based on the January 2022 pupil numbers. The DfE are expected to announce the position for 2023-24 in the middle to late December, although the announcements they made last July gives us an idea of the likely funding
- 3.2 The DfE will still amend the funding during the financial year to reflect the January 2023 census numbers and again after the financial year has finished to reflect the January 2024 census.
- 3.3 A consultation took place on early years funding earlier in the year, while it closed on the 16 September we still await the outcome, but from this we can glean some of the likely funding consequences.

3.4 3 & 4 year old funding

There is a new minimum 1% increase for all Local Authorities. This is an improvement for Southwark as we are one of the authorities that has not been receiving any increase in the hourly rate over the past few years, as we have been capped due to our existing high level of funding relative to other boroughs. This allows an estimated increase to the hourly rate for next year of 15p. This is slightly higher than 1% the extra realigns the income to the expenditure.

3.5 2 year old funding

As a result of proposed changes to the area cost adjustment, Southwark is one of the boroughs whose increase in funding would exceed the capping threshold 8.6%, so we will have to wait for the following year to receive the full increase. This allows an estimated increase to the hourly rate for next year of 45p.

3.6 Maintained Nursery Schools (MNS) Supplementary Protection

Nationally an extra £10m has been added to the MNS supplementary protection. There is no expected changes for us, as under the consultation we are neither capped under the proposals and we do not benefit from the floor that has been set. The previously announced increase of 3.1% still does apply though. It is suggested the Nursery schools agree the method of distribution between themselves of the expected protection of £1.2m.

3.7 Current Teacher Pay & Pension Grant

The consultation proposes to add the current schools' grants to the main early years funding formula for nursery settings rather than being paid as a specific grant based on cost to the school. There is no schools ring-fence, so the funding formerly received by schools would be spread across all providers. If no action were taken, this would mean schools losing out on 45% of their current funding from the grants, which is the equivalent of a 15p cut in the hourly rate (and this includes the new 1% increase). This would clearly have a material impact on nursery provision in schools.

The Department for Education have recognised this and have suggested to avoid turbulence that the use of the quality factor be added to local authoritys' early years formulae to address the issue if so wished. This quality factor allocation could be determined by the number of qualified teachers a setting has. Using teacher numbers would re-direct the funding back to those settings who previously received the teachers' pay and pensions grant, plus any other settings with qualified teachers.

3.8 While we currently we do not have a full set of qualified teacher numbers in all early year settings, appendix A gives some initially modelling.

As this is a formula change, all Early Years settings will need to be consulted. The Schools Forum is asked whether they wish the Local Authority to proceed with a consultation on this matter with early year settings during December. The outcome of the consultation would be reported to the Schools Forum at the January 2023 meeting for a final decision on the matter.

4 Funding Rates for 2023/24

The tables below show the estimated hour rates for 2, 3 and 4 year olds as shown in earlier paragraphs.

4.1 EYSFF Base Rates - 3 & 4 Year Olds

The outcome of the consultation on proposed changes in the funding formula used to fund local authorities has not yet been published. The estimates below assume the implementation of the proposals.

5 Early Years Central Retentions

- 5.1 The LA retains a proportion of the Early Years Block in order to meet its statutory duties in respect of early education and childcare as set out in the Childcare Act of 2016 and related guidance. These include:
 - Duty to secure free early education for all 3 and 4 year olds and specified 2-year-olds
 - Duty to collect information about individual children receiving early years provision and supply that information to DfE (school and early years census)
 - Duty to fund early education places in all sectors using a locally-determined, transparent formula: the early years single funding formula
 - Duty to secure information, advice, and training for childcare providers in their area
 - Duty to provide information, advice, and assistance to parents and prospective parents on the provision of childcare in their area.

These duties are delivered through three small teams within Children's & Adults services:

- The Free Early Learning Team (3 staff) manages the free early education offer process, including termly headcount/claims process, funding to early years settings and promoting the free entitlement to parents.
- The Early Years Quality Improvement Team (6 staff) provides information, advice, and support to the 150 early years group care settings and 350 childminders in Southwark.
- The Early Years Consultants (4 staff) in the Standards team provide information, advice, and support to schools in relation to the Early Years Foundation Stage.
- 5.2 For 2023-24 the limit for central retentions on the Early Years Block continues to be 5%. In 2022-23 this amounted to £921,000. With the fall in pupil numbers it is expected the early years block will decrease. Based on an estimate fall in pupil numbers of 4.8% this would mean the 5% central retention will fall from £921k to £875k. This reduction will be applied to Family Early Help Service in the light of their increased trading highlighted elsewhere on this agenda

- 5.3 The Family Early Help (FEH) and Transformation Service provides a team of 68 staff, directly delivering a whole family approach, and supports the integration of Under 5s work including the coordination of Children & Family Centres (CFCs). The whole family approach delivered by FEH Practitioners and CFC Family workers ensures that all children and adults within a household are offered support.
- 5.4 In 2020-21 there were 2,700 referrals made into the FEH service. Health is the largest referral source into FEH at 28%, with Education consisting of 23%. The age groups of referrals indicate the spread of concern:
 - > 26% Under 5
 - > 40% Primary age
 - > 34% Secondary age

From April 2021 – September 2021 of the 1691 children engaged with early help (i.e. new assessments or ongoing engagement) 32% were under 5, 28% aged 5-9, 32% 10-15 and 7% over 16.
