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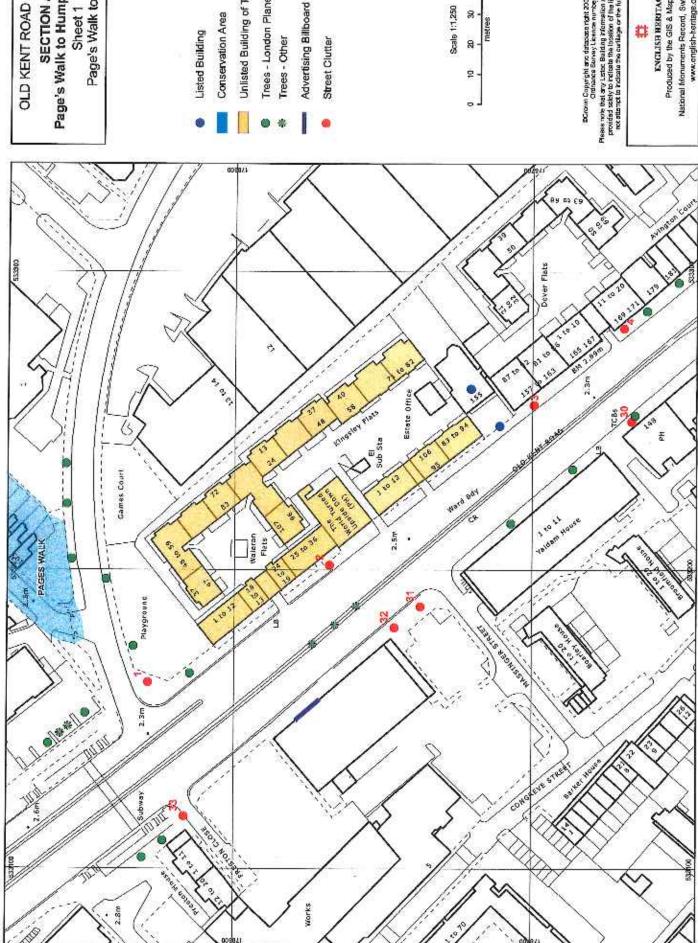

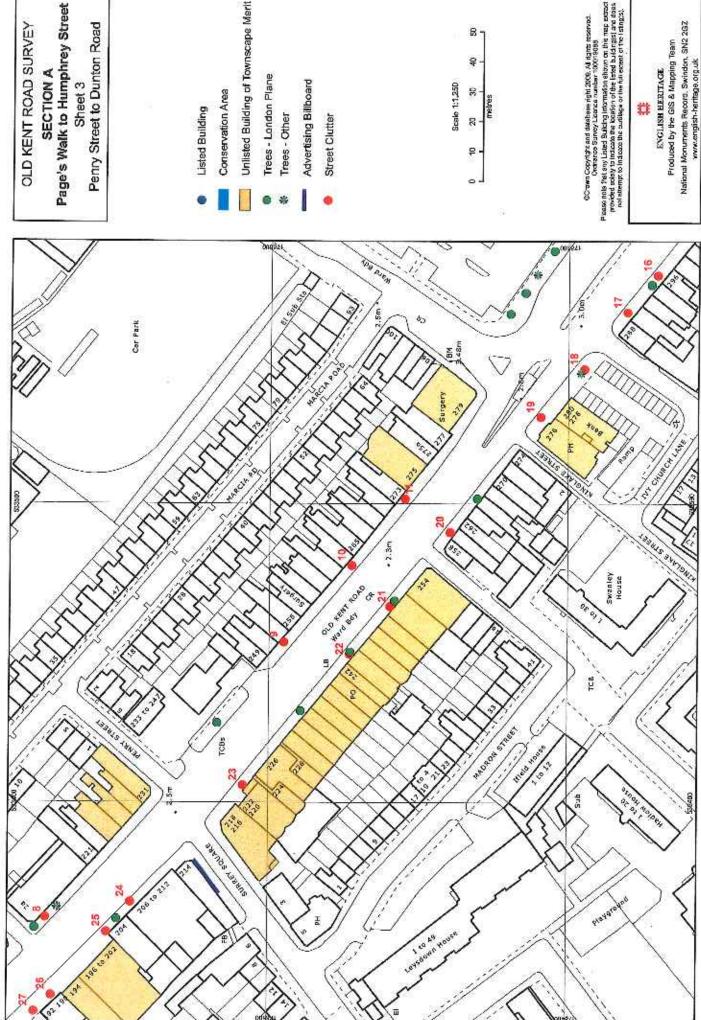

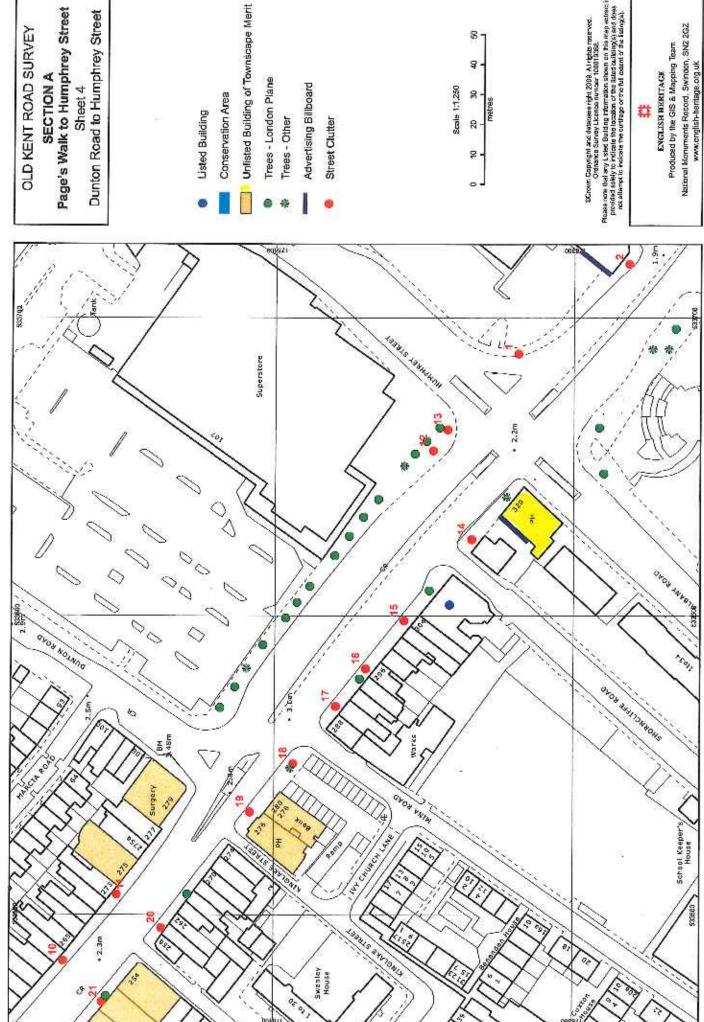

A.2 Brief History

This section of the Old Kent Road retains elements of its commercial and residential past, as well as traces of the Victorian goods yard which stood on a huge site south of Willow Walk, now part-occupied by the Mandela Way Industrial Estate.

EARLY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT- THE ROLLS ESTATE

Remnants of late C18 and early C19 ribbon development are still visible along the road. Much of the land then belonged to the Rolls family: the White House at No 155 and the north side of Surrey Square are both the work of Michael Searles, surveyor to the estate, and went up in the 1790s. Remarkably, both developments retain original railings and ironwork. The terrace at Nos 218-250 incorporates further late C18 houses, also by Searle, now part-hidden behind C19 shop extensions.

INDUSTRIAL PAST - THE BRICKLAYER'S ARMS GOODS YARD

The Bricklayers' Arms Goods Depot started life in 1844 as a passenger and freight terminal, in a building designed by Lewis Cubbit, of King's Cross fame. It opened as a goods yard in 1866 and remained in operation until 1980. Little of the complex now remains: some Victorian paving is still visible on the corner with Mandela Way and a few other vestiges can be seen around Willow Walk. Luckily, some fine railway workers' housing of 1840 has survived in Page's Walk and is now designated as a Conservation Area.

SOCIAL HOUSING AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS

The late C19 saw the building of large-scale social housing south of the goods yard; these buildings are now Peabody Estates and remain in good condition (with original railings). In 1903 the fire station at Nos 212-216 was rebuilt by the London County Council Architect's Department and is a fine example of a grand Edwardian civic building.

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY

This section of the Old Kent Road was a vibrant shopping street which played host to stall-holders and costermongers until the arrival of the tram in 1871. The C19 terrace at Nos 227-231 previously incorporated a hatter's shop, now demolished, while some fine early C20 shop fronts can still be seen at Nos 194-202 and 275. The lively atmosphere that characterised this section of the Old Kent Road before it became a major transport artery can still be found in nearby East Street.

A.2 Brief History (cont.)

There are four surviving public houses of particular merit along this stretch of the road: the World Turned Upside Down, the Dun Cow, the Green Man and the Thomas à Becket. The first is reputed to have stood on the site since the C17, with the current incarnation an 1868 remodeling of an earlier building. There is much debate surrounding the origins of the name, with some saying that it relates to the discovery of Australia, others to a radical song of the C17, while others argue that it refers to things being generally out of kilter. According to Victorian author Jacob Larwood, the name was in "former ages" represented on sign boards with depictions of "animals chasing men, horses riding in carriages, and similar conceits and pleasantries". The Dun Cow and Green Man originally stood next to a C18 toll gate introduced by the Turnpike Trust to fund road improvements. No 186, a late C19 building, contains some very fine decorative tiles evoking the history of the Old Kent Road and its connection with Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales*. The Thomas à Becket also reflects this legacy and stands on a site once known as the Thomas à Watering, referred to by Chaucer in his Prologue:

"And forth we ridden a litel more than pas, Unto the watering of Seint Thomas, And then our host began his hors arrest."

This was the pilgrims' first stop on the route to Canterbury, and once marked the boundary of the City liberties.

B.2 Brief History

This section of the Old Kent Road underwent dramatic changes in the C20, with the introduction of large public housing schemes and more recently, a superstore east of Ossory Road. Prior to this it was a mainly residential area, with a variety of shops fronting onto the highway.

EARLY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT- C19 SURVIVALS

Much of the area south of the Old Kent Road and east of Albany Road was cleared after World War II to make way for Burgess Park, a new green space whose creation was recommended by Abercrombie and Forshaw in their County of London Plan of 1943. To the credit of Southwark Council, three parallel historic streets were saved from the bulldozer in the 1970s: Cobourg Road, Trafalgar Avenue and Glengall Road. These contain fine Georgian and early Victorian villas and terraces and are now designated as conservation areas.

INDUSTRIAL PAST- GRAND SURREY CANAL

There are very few surviving signs of the bustling area which developed in Victorian times on what is now Burgess Park. Small workshops, factories and timber yards stood cheek to jowl with a web of terraced housing and a scattering of public buildings. After a short spell as a tranquil and desirable residential area in the early C19, this section of the Old Kent Road became increasingly industrialised to the south, deriving much of its activity from the Grand Surrey Canal (see Section C).

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY

The C19 terrace at Nos 360-386 has retained its commercial character, and now has a rich mix of shops and local services. The shop fronts have benefited from refurbishment and this stretch of the Old Kent Road is successful in evoking a lively Victorian past.

SOCIAL HOUSING AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS

There are several large housing estates in this section of the Old Kent Road, including some erected by the London County Council in the first half of the C20. Avondale Square is a good example of a Post-War housing estate which successfully incorporates tower blocks, slabs and maisonettes, with regard for detailing and landscaping.

B.2 Brief History (cont.)

The Lord Nelson is a very handsome public house on the corner of Trafalgar Avenue and the Old Kent Road. It was originally built in the early C19 (the name hints to an early date) and was extended in the later C19. It has a very fine interior, including an original bar with carved wood fittings, painted decorative mirrors showing scenes from Nelson's career, well executed mosaic floors and attractive stain-glassed windows. No 365 is a later C19 survival of a public house with some attractive decorative features.

C.2 Brief History

The focus for this section of the road is the junction with the Grand Surrey Canal, which was built in the early C19 to facilitate the transport of goods from the Thames to south London and the South Metropolitan Gasworks, which occupied a large site to the north of the Old Kent Road.

EARLY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT- C19 SURVIVALS

Nos 541-549, an impressive Victorian terrace, stands isolated on the east corner of Marlborough Grove opposite a large retail development and gives a flavour of the type of housing which existed in this area. Canal Grove is a delightful Regency residential enclave, just north-east of the site where the canal route crosses the Old Kent Road. The houses were built in the early C19, before the advent of the gasworks, and it is surprising to note that they retain the peaceful setting they must have enjoyed at the time. No 641 is a C19 residential building converted to commercial use.

INDUSTRIAL PAST- SOUTH METROPOLITAN GASWORKS

As with Section B, the building of the Grand Surrey Canal had a significant impact on this area of the Old Kent Road. The first section of the canal was built in 1802-1811, between Surrey Docks and Camberwell, and a short branch was added to extend it to Peckham in 1825-6. The other significant infrastructure was the Southern Metropolitan Gasworks, which remained operational until the Post-War period and relied on the Surrey Canal for its supplies of coal. The gasholders are of interest in their own right.

SOCIAL HOUSING AND PUBLIC BUILDINGS

The North Peckham Civic Centre is a modernist building typical of its time, designed by F. O. Hayes of Southwark Borough Architect's Department in 1962-7. It contains an extraordinary ceramic mural by A Kossowski, which charts the history of the Old Kent Road from its beginnings as a Roman Road, to its use as a pilgrim's route in the Middle Ages, through to its later role as a processional route for Charles II's return from exile into its development and modernisation in the C20. Further east stands the Livesey Museum, which was endowed as a library in 1890 by George Livesey, Chairman of the Metropolitan Gas Works and was in community use until fairly recently. Christchurch, next to it, was built in 1867-8 to replace an earlier church.

C.2 Brief History (cont.)

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY

There are some stretches of commercial buildings east of the bridge crossing at Peckham Park Road, notably Nos 610-636 (mid- C19) and Nos 644-672 (late C19) which are still in use as retail units. Nos 644-672, the Royal London Buildings are particularly well executed and display a masterly use of terracotta. No 639 seems to be a purpose-built Victorian factory / warehouse, a building type which occurs surprisingly rarely on the road. There is another example of this type of building at Nos 731-733 (see section D). A small-scale commercial development can be seen at No 691. Now used as a car dealership, it retains an interesting and well preserved early C20 shop front.

D.2 Brief History

This section of the Old Kent Road bears witness to the C19 industrialisation of the area to the north. The area to the south retains its residential character, integrating high quality C19 housing developments with C20 council schemes. The introduction of the railway in the 1860s marked the intensification of residential development in what just a few decades earlier had been a rural area with a scattering of high quality housing.

EARLY RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT- C19 SURVIVALS

Nos 864 and 866 and Nos 880-884 were built in c.1815 by John Lamb, a local timber merchant. They have the unusual feature of having ammonite capitals, shell-like decorative features shaped to resemble fossils. These can also be seen in Brighton where they were used in the early C19 by the architect Amon Henry Wylds.

SOCIAL HOUSING AND PUBLIC BUILBINGS

There are two notable residential developments in the nearby area: the Licensed Victuallers' Asylum of 1827 and Clifton Crescent of 1847-51. The Licensed Victuallers' Asylum, now known as Caroline Gardens, were erected in 1827 to accommodate retired members of the profession. Buildings were added in the 1860s to create one of the finest compositions of its kind in London. The Chapel is derelict but retains noteworthy internal features- including fine funerary monuments- which survived bomb damage sustained during the Second World War. Clifton Crescent was built in 1847 in a Regency style, It was refurbished by Southwark Council and is now an attractive feature of the area.

COMMERCIAL ACTIVITY

There was a railway station just south of the railway viaduct which now demarcates the boundary between the London Boroughs of Southwark and Lewisham, bar a few properties on the final stretch of the Old Kent Road to the east. This station opened in 1866 and was operated by the London, Brighton and South Coast Railway (LB&SCR); it closed in 1917.

D.2 Brief History (cont.)

The Kentish Drovers is the last of a series of historic public houses on the Old Kent Road. It was built in c.1840 and features an exceptional painted ceramic mural depicting drovers in a landscape- another reference to the road's varied and rich history. This has recently been recovered, following over-painting, and once again adds to the area's historic character and local distinctiveness.

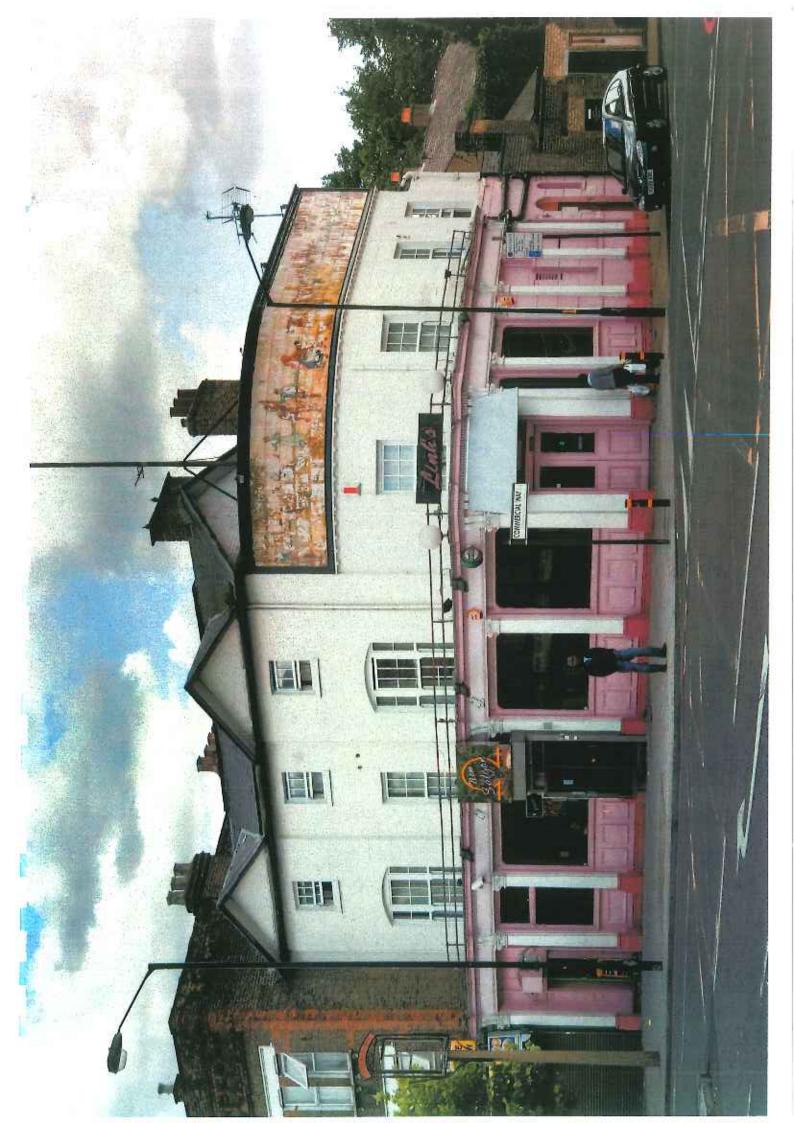


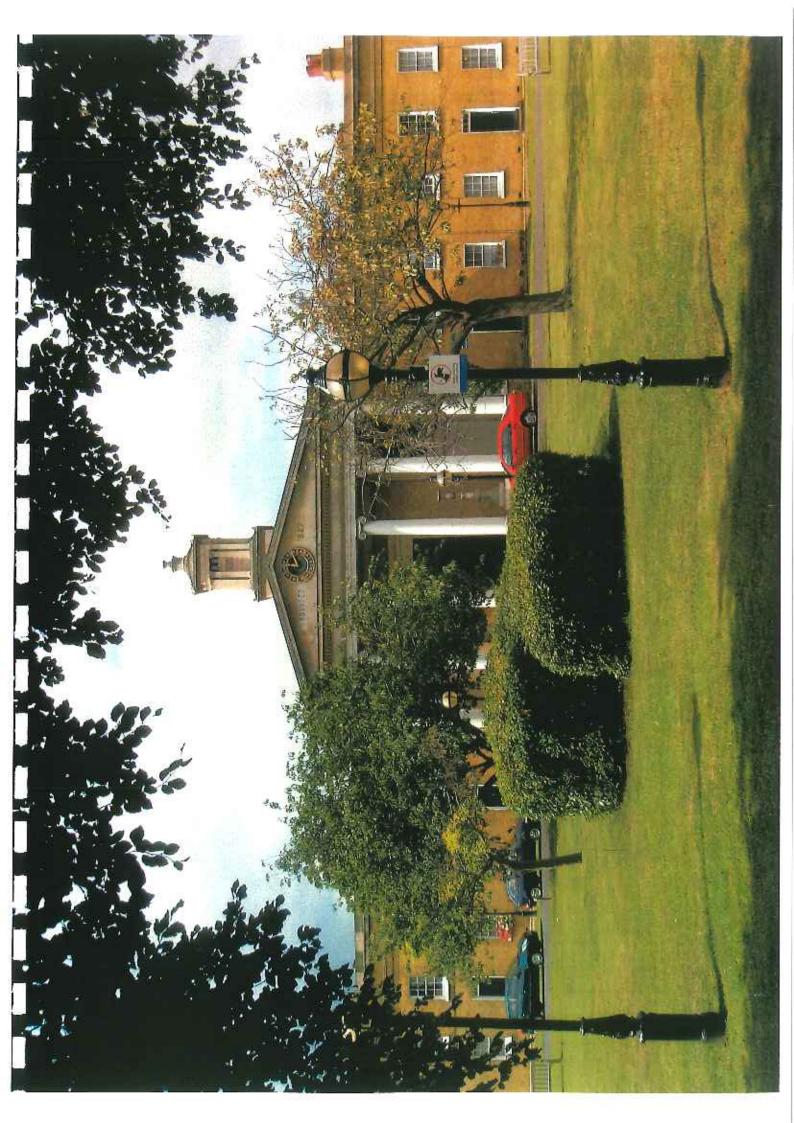
