- Apply to the 16 to 19 Bursary
 Fund if you are eligible
- Do let us know if you intend to be home educated
- Do let us know if you have barriers to education, employment or training and need further guidance
- Complete the Post 16 activity survey with your new education, employment or training destination, or if you need guidance



Post 16 to 18 Service

Most young people in Southwark move on to education in a sixth form or further education college each year in the September after they turn 16, or they may start an apprenticeship or other employment with training. All school leavers must stay in some type of education or training until they are 18 or to the end of their academic year 13 if they are studying full time. To enable them to achieve a full level 3 qualification by the time they are 19.

In England you can leave school on the last Friday in June if you'll be 16 by the end of the summer holidays. You must then do one of the following until you're 18:

- Stay in full-time education, for example at a college
- Start an apprenticeship
- Spend 20 hours or more a week working or volunteering, while in part-time education or training.

We know that some 16 and 17 year old young people may find themselves out of education and we are here to help. The Post 16 to 18 Service works with young people not in education, employment or training, offering advice and guidance by phone or email to identify best routes back into education and employment career planning. We work closely with colleges and training providers to find the right support for each young person to help them move forward with their career goals.



This can include exploring routes into courses, or apprenticeships based on each individual's starting point.

Please use our **Post 16 Survey** form to let us know what you are up to. If you tell us that you are not in education or training we will get in touch and signpost you or advise you on your options. You can also email us at **post16service@southwark.gov.uk**.

Information on Raising the Participation Age (RPA)

What is 'Raising the Participation Age' [RPA]?

All young people have a duty by the Education Skills Act (2008) to participate in education until their 18th birthday. Supported by parents/ carers, and schools, the Government expects each young person to make an informed decision about how they wish to participate.

Why was it introduced?

By staying in learning and training you can gain the qualifications and skills you need to help you to succeed. Advantages include:

- Making it easier to find and stay in a job
- Having the ability to earn and give you a greater choice of career paths
- Being able to compete in the future local job market; providing pathways to opportunities where you can develop your qualifications and skills further in order to support your future career aspirations for example, higher education (university) or higher apprenticeships
- You will have a greater chance to develop the knowledge and practical skills that employers are looking for.

Does this mean staying at school until I am 18?

Once you complete your GCSEs and secondary education, there are a number of options available for you to choose from:

- Continue in full time education or college
- Start a work based learning programme such as an apprenticeship
- Start full time work alongside part time learning which leads to an accredited qualification
- Volunteering for a minimum of 20 hours a week alongside part time learning which leads to an accredited qualification.

What duty does Southwark Council have?

 Promote the effective participation in education and training of 16 and 17 year olds in our area with a view to ensuring that those persons fulfil the duty to participate in education or training

- Make arrangements to track the activity of 16 and 17 year olds, and identify those who are not participating in education or training or who have left provision, to enable us to offer support as soon as possible through the Post 16 to 18 Service
- Identify 18 year olds in-year 13 who need support to stay in education or find work, and recognise those who are receiving support from their Jobcentre Plus.



Choosing the right pathway for you

Advice about courses

If you are likely to leave school at the end of year 11 with no or few GCSEs or other level 2 passes, you should still follow the check list. Or if you are new to the UK starting year 12 you may want to consider starting from an ESOL programme.

Short courses are recommended at the end of the academic year, this is because there are limited progression routes into paid employment or an apprenticeship if you are under 18.

If you live in Southwark and missed the start date at sixth form or college, or you have recently moved into the borough and find yourself out of education get in touch with the Post 16 to 18 Service by email at post16service@southwark.gov.uk or complete the Post 16 activity survey.

Checklist

The following checklist may be very useful. This would enable you to create your career pathway plan. Learning how to make an informed choice, by asking:

- How does the chosen course develop your interests, skills-set and subject knowledge?
- Does the chosen course require course work and exams, what will the workload look like?

- What do you need to be motivated to keep learning?
- What are the progression routes, would the chosen course enable you to achieve your career goal?
- How much study time would you need in order to achieve a good result?
- What are the barriers to your learning that need to be removed to keep you focused and realise your own potential?
- What are your options? The National Career Service is available to guide you in the right direction.

How to choose?

While you are in year 11 at school or being home educated, you may already have an idea about your future academic and career journey, such as applying for sixth form then higher education or a particular career. Some careers and university courses require you to have specific subject grades in accredited qualifications. They will ask to see your certificates as part of the entry requirements. When received keep your qualification certificates safe.

Do speak to your careers adviser at school and ask the questions as soon as you can. This should help you to make an informed decision to continue in education anything from an entry level to a level 3 programme, A levels, BTEC, a T level qualification, or a level 2 intermediate apprenticeship. Remember to have a backup plan if you don't meet the entry requirements for your first choice, so you can continue learning.

Academic Qualifications

Entry Level Qualifications

Entry level qualifications are usually full time one year study programmes available at three sublevels E1, E2 and E3. Most colleges offer entry level qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18, allowing E3 students to move onto the next level 1 programme. See **Which pathway is right for me?**

These are helpful for students who have missed education or are new to the UK, and want to improve in a chosen subject, including English and Maths. Contact colleges directly for an entry assessment.

See Colleges (pages 57 to 65). Start dates are from September. Contact the college in advance of the planned start date for assessment and enrolment.

Level 1

Level 1 qualifications are usually full time, one year study programmes equivalent to GCSE - grades 1 to 3 or grades D to G: Level 1 award; first certificate or diploma; functional Skills level 1. These are helpful for students who want to improve their knowledge and skills in a chosen subject area, including English and Maths.

Most colleges offer level 1 qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18, allowing students to move onto a level 2 programme. Start dates are in September or January.

Contact the chosen college direct in advance for an entry assessment interview. **See Colleges** (pages 57 to 65).

Level 2

Level 2 qualifications are usually full time one year study programmes equivalent to GCSE grades 4 and above, or A to C: e.g. level 2 BTEC, Cambridge Technical, or T level Transition Programme (TLTP).

These are helpful for students who did not achieve the entry requirements for a level 3 programme or want to improve their knowledge, and skills in a chosen subject area, including English and Maths.

Most colleges and some sixth forms offer level 2 qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18, allowing students to move onto a level 3 programme.

Start dates are in September. Contact the college in advance of the planned start date for assessment and enrolment.

Contact chosen college direct for an entry assessment. **See Colleges** (pages 57 to 65).

Level 3

Level 3 qualifications are usually full time twoyear study programmes equivalent to three A levels: Applied general; BTEC level 3 award, certificate, diploma, national diploma; International Baccalaureate diploma; T Level; Tech levels. These are usually a combination of coursework and exams (examination boards may vary between colleges and sixth forms). Requesting a move to a different education provider during year 12 or 13 may not always be possible. Most colleges and sixth forms offer level 3 qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18. Students often move onto employment or university. Start dates are in September; contact the college or sixth form, at least six months in advance of the planned start date. If you miss the start date by more than two weeks, you may have to wait for the next academic year. **See Sixth Forms and Colleges** (pages 19 to 65).

A levels

Are level 3 full time two year study programmes. Preparing to study A levels, students would need good GCSE grades to meet the entry requirements. Students sit all A level exams at the end of two years of study, will have no more than a 20% coursework component (examination boards may vary between colleges and sixth forms). Requesting a move to a different education provider during year 12 or 13 may not always be possible.

Most sixth forms offer A level qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18, allowing students to move onto an apprenticeship, university or employment.

Start dates are in September. Contact the college or sixth form at least six months in advance of the planned start date. Check the chosen sixth form or college's website for entry requirements. **See Sixth Forms** (page 19 to 56 and page 62 to 65).



Other Qualifications

T Levels Oualifications

Some colleges and sixths forms offer T levels 20% work experience, 80% study in class, 3 months' work experience with the opportunity to grow your knowledge and skills. Equivalent to A levels that lead to a specific occupation.

Students can progress on to apprenticeships, jobs and some universities after successful completion Providers delivering T Levels and the T Level foundation year

Tech Levels

Also include Alternative Academic Qualifications (AAQs), Vocational Technical Qualifications (VTQs) e.g. BTEC and Cambridge Technical level 2 and 3. They are for students 16 to 19 who want to develop transferable knowledge and skills, through applied learning, covering a specific vocational area.

They allow entry to a range of higher education courses, either by meeting the entry requirements in their own right or being accepted alongside other qualifications at Level 3 such as A levels. Many colleges and sixth forms offer Tech level qualifications for young people aged 16 to 18, allowing students to move onto an apprenticeship, university or employment.

National Vocational Qualifications Supported Learning (NVQs)

Are at level 2 to 7. The NVQ is a practical work-based qualification focusing on the student's practical skills; the NVQ is assessed in the workplace. Students will complete training, build up a portfolio of evidence based on their professional experience.

Southwark College offer Supported Learning courses to support people with Educational Health Care Plans and Special Educational Needs and Disabilities to gain more independence, improve knowledge and get the guidance and encouragement they need to successfully move into work. Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships give you the opportunity to work, learn and earn all at the same time.

You will work for a real employer alongside other experienced staff. You will be earning a salary, gaining valuable work experience and employability skills, and you will gain a qualification.

You can apply for different types of apprenticeships based on your current skills and qualifications:

- Intermediate level (level 2)
- Advanced level (level 3)
- Higher (levels 4, 5 and 6)

When can I start an apprenticeship?

If you live in England and are aged 16 or over, you can apply to be an apprentice. You can start an apprenticeship on the first day after the last Friday in June (official school leaving date in England) as long as you are 16 or become 16 before 1 September of that year. You will need to be living in England and not in fulltime education.

Entry requirements

Entry requirements are based on the level of the apprenticeship. Intermediate Level 2 apprenticeships will usually require 3 to 5 GCSEs grade 4 or above including English and Maths. Or the willingness to work towards level 2 English and Maths functional skills qualifications during the apprenticeship.

Advanced level apprenticeships usually require five good GCSE grades 4 or above. Higher level apprenticeships require good GCSE grades 4 to 9, and a level 3 qualification such as BTEC level 3 or three A levels, or a two year T Level. Or a level 2 apprenticeship qualification with a year's work experience.

Remember to check if you meet the eligibility criteria. This may include asking if you can to work and train in the UK post 16. For example you would need a national insurance number, a bank account, a leave to remain status, or UK settled status.

How do I find and apply for an apprenticeship?

When you finish year 11, then you can start an apprenticeship. Applying is easy with the **find an apprenticeship website**. You need to create an account, log all of your information and set preferences before applying, usually by completing an online application form and answering a few questions set by the employer.


If you need help to meet the entry requirements, you could consider applying to college. Remember you should do your best to participate while you are in-year 12 and 13 this should enable you to progress towards your career goal.

How much will I earn?

The minimum wage for apprentices aged 16 to 18 is updated yearly on the website www.gov.uk/apprenticeshipsguide/pay and-conditions.



Which pathway is right for me?



There will be specific requirements for courses and jobs, some may have higher entry requirements than others.

If you do not achieve a minimum of a grade 4 at GCSE in Maths and English or level 2 Functional Skills, you will be encouraged to continue studying Maths and/or English.

Where can you study or train?

At the end of year 11 you have a number of choices of where to study. It is worth doing some research into the ones you are interested in. You can find information on the internet. Open days or taster days are available to check and see whether you think sixth form or college is right for you.

Further education colleges (FE colleges)

Many FE colleges offer a broad range of courses at different levels from A levels, BTECs, Entry level programmes, ESOL, GCSE retakes, Life Skills, T levels, and Vocational courses.

FE colleges are large organisations and they may have more than one site. **See pages 57 to 65** for all colleges in London.

School sixth forms

Schools sixth forms primarily teach A levels but some may offer vocational courses such as BTECs and T levels.

Some offer resits in GCSE Maths and English with a core subject: forming a BTEC, vocational, or a T level Transition Programme, if you did not get a grade 4 or above the first time round. This pathway would prepare you for A levels, an apprenticeship or employment by the time you are 18.

School sixth forms are smaller than most sixth form colleges and further education colleges.

You don't usually have to wear school uniform but smart clothing may be required and you will need to attend every day.

Sixth form colleges

Sixth form colleges are for 16 to 19 year olds. They have on average 1,200 students studying from entry level up to A levels and BTEC nationals.

They offer a wide range of courses including applied courses.

Although there are no sixth form colleges in Southwark there are a number in neighbouring boroughs that you can apply for. See pages 62 to 65.

University technical colleges (UTCs)

If you know the sector you wish to pursue a career in and want to develop specialist skills you may apply to a UTC. Technical specialisms include engineering, manufacturing, health sciences, product design, digital technologies or built environment.

Training providers

Some training programmes are designed to add to your attainment level, or gain some qualifications, and add to your skills-set to help you to get work ready.

Often, short courses are recommended at the end of the academic year. This is because there are limited progression routes into paid employment or an apprenticeship if you are under 18, or if the local labour market is stagnant.

Many colleges offer training programmes to enable you to get back on track. If you find yourself out of education mid year please email the Post 16 to 18 Service on **post16service@southwark.gov.uk** or complete the **Post 16 activity survey**. Any full time regulated qualification would benefit you in your career, enabling you to make an informed decision to fill in your skills gaps to achieve your career plan.

If you are unsure what you would like to do, remember at the end of year 12 or 13, you could still do the CSCS (Construction Skills Certification Scheme), first aid, football coaching, or work experience during your holidays.

What comes next?

Your choices after you have completed your chosen pathway at 18

Employment

At 18 you can leave education and get a full time job. Some young people may start employment inyear 12 and 13 part time while they are studying, or full time with training.

If you are an employee in the UK you are expected to follow the company rules and procedures, and your employer must follow and respect your employment rights.

Be prepared and know where to go to find out more about:

- Contract of employment
- Minimum wage
- National insurance contributions
- Work time regulations
- Work trials
- Young workers

Also, check how pay may affect your family's benefits or the household income. If you are a worker, get to know your rights about pay, holiday entitlement, sick pay, maternity pay, paternity pay, weekly working hours and notice periods.

Some young people will go on to work for the family business in year 12 and 13, you still have worker rights. The rules are different if you are **self-employed**.

Higher and Degree Apprenticeships

A higher apprenticeship leads to a higher education level qualification (at level 4, 5, 6 or 7). Qualifications on offer include NVQ (National Vocational Qualification) level 4, HND (Higher National Diploma) and foundation degrees.

Degree apprenticeships offer a full bachelor's or master's degree. Apprenticeships at higher or degree level could be up to six years.

University

Some professions (e.g. architecture, teaching or medicine) require a degree. Many more employers now expect their staff to have high levels of education.

Going to university gives you the chance to study a subject you are passionate about. In higher education you can develop valuable skills to give you a wider range of career opportunities.

For a few people, choosing a subject to study is simple – you will either be clear about your career path and need a specific degree to follow or you have always had a passion for a particular subject. However, for most there is a bewildering variety of courses, many of which involve subjects that are not taught in schools or colleges. Do your research to narrow your choices down.

Financial support

As a post 16 to 18 year old student you may be able to get funding help while you study full time. Students must meet the age and residency criteria to be eligible for help from the bursary fund.

16 to 19 bursary fund while you are at College

Check eligibility criteria with the sixth form or college. You can ask for a bursary form at enrolment day.

A student must be aged 16 or over but under 19 on before they start the academic year to be eligible for help from the bursary fund they should have good attendance and behaviour for the whole academic year.

The college would ask you to provide evidence when you complete the application form. If you do not meet the requirements or provide the evidence within the requested timeframe you may not get a bursary.

16 to 19 Bursary Fund guide.

There are two types of 16 to 19 bursary:

Discretionary bursary

Exceptions for the discretionary bursary are for students aged 19 and who are continuing on the same study programme they began aged 16 to 18 (19+ continuers) or students aged 19 or over who have an Education, Health, and Care (EHC) Plan.

You could get a discretionary bursary if you need financial help but don't qualify for a vulnerable student bursary. Your education or training provider decides how much you get and what it's used for i.e. free meal support.

Successful applicants of this bursary receive funds for course related expenditure if the household annual income is £28000 or below.

Students must meet the residency criteria in **ESFA funding regulations** for post 16 provision.

Vulnerable student bursary

You could get a bursary worth up to £1,200 depending on your circumstances.

This group includes:

- People in care
- Care leavers
- People claiming income support
- Disabled young people who receive Employment Support Allowance and Disability Living Allowance

How is your bursary paid?

Your education or training provider will decide how you get your bursary. You might be:

- Paid in full or in instalments
- Paid through a bank account

 Given things like a travel pass, free meals or books instead of money

Your provider will set conditions that students should meet to receive a bursary for example, good behaviour and 95% attendance. Your bursary could be stopped if you break their rules. Remember to check the bursary eligibility criteria with the sixth form or college.

Benefits

The general rule on benefits is that if you are under 18 you cannot make a claim for any benefits.

Your parents/carers will still get any child benefit or other benefits they already receive as long as you are under 19 and in full time education. If you are not engaged, and not meeting the Raising the Participation Age (RPA) requirements, some benefits may cease.

If you are living away from your parents, out of necessity, or have family to support, you may be able to make a claim.

Care to learn

You can claim Care to Learn if you are under 20, caring for your own child and doing a school and college course or training programme that receives public funding (fathers are eligible if they are the main carers). An application can be made as soon as you have a confirmed offer of a course.
